


ANYONE WHO DOUBTED that a true metalhead would ever turn up on American Idol was surely surprised when Judas Priest joined James Durbin for the show's Season 10 finale earlier this year. Months after he finished his stint on the show, though, this 22-year-old California native is quick to defuse skepticism over his headbanger bona fides. "I'm not gonna go out there and say, 'This is a metal record,' " Durbin remarks of his just-released debut, Memories of a Beautiful Disaster. "It's a hard-rock record. But I did bring in aspects of the metal I listen to, like the soaring vocals of Rob Halford and Ronnie James Dio." He laughs. "There's a lot of long notes on this thing.'

He can say that again. Produced by Howard Benson-who also helmed Idol alum Chris Daughtry's hit 2006 debut-Memories proves

Durbin's sky-high vocals were no made-for-TV creation. "As far as chops go, James had it all," Benson says. "And nobody works harder than he does. For us, making this record was really about finding the best songs." The fact that some of those tunes came from the pen of pro songwriter Marti Frederiksen (Aerosmith, Mötley Crüe) still blows Durbin's mind, as did his recent experience auditioning musicians for his new touring band.

"That morning I was drinking my Throat Coat tea from my Kiss Army mug and something told me to put on my Dressed to Kill T-shirt," he remembers. "So I walk into SIR [rehearsal studios] in Hollywood and somebody goes, 'Hey, nice shirt. You know Kiss were rehearsing in this space right before you?' I was like, 'No way!" Durbin shakes his head, "Paul Stanley's sweat was in the air. You could feel it."
